  - b. Observance of Trial in two cases, one Civil and one Criminal: Students will attend two trials. They will maintain a record and enter the various steps observed during their attendance on different days in the Court assignment.

**UNIT III**

**Interviewing techniques and Pre-trial Preparations and internship diary:**

Each student will observe two interviewing sessions of clients at the Lawyer's Office/Legal Aid Office and record the proceedings in a diary. Each student will further observe the preparation of documents and court papers by the Advocates and the procedure for the filing of the suit/petition. This will be recorded in the diary. Minimum period of internship: (a) each registered student shall have completed minimum of 20 weeks internship during the entire period of legal studies under NGO's, Trial and Appellate Judiciary, Legal Regulatory Authorities, Legislatures and Parliament, other Legal Functionaries, Law Firms, Companies, Local Self Government and other such bodies where Law is Practiced either in action or in dispute resolution or in management; as directed by the Head of the Institution. Provided that internship in any year cannot be for a continuous period of more than four weeks and the Internship shall preferably be done during each summer vacation for four weeks during every year of course.

The fourth component of this paper will be Viva-Voce examination on all the above three aspects.
